The Draw Squad's TEN KEY WORDS OF DRAWING

These Ten Key Words can be successfully combined to create the illusion of three-dimensional drawing.

This method, which has worked tremendously well in my classrooms, teaches the students fundamental drawing skills in a structured format to ensure success. I've found that the "idea launch" or the "extra button" is the motivator in getting students to use the Ten Key Words without copying my illustrations. This helps each student develop his or her own style of skilled visual expression.

Foreshortening

Distorting objects or parts of an object to create the illusion that one edge is actually closer to your eye.



Shading

Adding darkness to a surface that is opposite an imaginary light source adds depth to your drawing.



Surface

Drawing objects or parts of an object lower on the surface of the paper makes them appear closer (with the exception of objects in space i.e. birds, clouds etc.).



Size

Generally, objects drawn larger will look closer, except when overlapping.



LESSON 1

Warm-up

All right, we've covered the basics: why drawing is important, how this book will teach you to draw, what to watch for, and the pre-test. Now, all we need to do is to get that pencil blasting across paper in 3-D! Fuel up your "pencil power" by shaking out your drawing hand vigorously and aggling your fingers for 15-30 seconds. It may look silly, but it's an important loosening-up exercise before each lesson. I call it DRAWERCIZE. (Thanks Judi Sheppard-Misset). Just as athletes stretch their muscles before working out, we artists warm up our drawing hands! Ready...Set...Go!





Key Drawing Word: Foreshortening


When you draw in 3-D, you create a visual illusion. By distorting images you make them accear three-dimensional even though your drawing surface is flat.

Foreshortening makes one part of an object appear closer than another. To understand this, a coin between your thumb and index finger. Hold it directly toward you so it forms a circle. The tilt the coin away from you until it looks like this:

A foreshortened circle! Foreshortening makes any drawing surface appear three-dimensional!





Drawing in 3-D is the distortion of an object on a flat surface, creating the illusion of depth. Use foreshortening to pull one edge of an object closer to you.


Complete the foreshortened circles.


